
President's Message**March 2014**





Lichota is Simsbury's Teacher of the Year

SIMSBURY – Betty Lichota is the Simsbury Teacher of the Year.

She is a product of the Simsbury public school system herself and between her 13 first days as a student and 40 first days as a teacher at Squadron Line, she jokes that she just celebrated her 53rd first day of school.


"I am Simsbury. You can sum up my education and career in Simsbury," she said.

Reminiscing about her childhood school days and living in Tariffville, she said she became a teacher because of the way her teachers encouraged her as a student.

"I like working with kids and people. I like learning something new – there's always something new on the horizon with technology, challenges and curriculum," Lichota said.

She is a lifelong learner and said that every year, with new students and colleagues, there is always something to look forward to. She enjoys teaching sixth grade at Squadron Line because she said that while it is elementary, she and her team of sixth-grade teachers try to prepare the students for middle school.

"This is the first year they switch core teachers. They have homeroom and then different subjects – for them it's a big change."

Her team collectively nominated her to be the 2013-14 Teacher of the Year and she said she is humbled and honored to represent them as Simsbury Teacher of the Year.

"Of course it's an honor. I was shocked. I tried to explain that all Teachers of the Year, me and the person before me, we are representing the teachers of Simsbury. I am not just representing the teachers, I am the teachers," she said. "The teacher I am today is due to all the bits and pieces of knowledge that I've gained from all my fellow teachers. That why I say that I'm one giant jigsaw puzzle."

She was announced on Aug. 26 at a welcome-back gathering where she gave credit to all the teachers, mentors and administrators who helped her during her

career.

Behind the podium was a visual presentation that included her Tariffville School kindergarten photo.

Squadron Line Principal Meg Evans said it was no surprise that Lichota was chosen by her colleagues as the Simsbury Teacher of the Year and she is proud of Lichota for achieving this distinguished honor.

In a press release, she said, "Betty is a consummate professional who puts the best interest of kids at the center of every decision she makes. She has a special way about her that fosters the development of the whole child – academically, socially and behaviorally. Her positive attitude, love of learning and kind nature bring out the best in the people around her."

Fellow Antique Auto Hobbyists:

At a press conference at the Legislative Office Building in Hartford this afternoon (Friday February 21, 2014), the Department of Motor Vehicles announced the release of the new design of the antique auto plates that I have been reporting on in recent 4C's newsletters. A .pdf file depicting the change to the antique car plate is attached. (While it may not be all that clear, the new Classic Vehicle plate will have dark blue lettering. Also, the new Classic Motorcycle plate will have the same white background as the Classic Vehicle plate.) Commissioner Currey announced that vanity plates with the new "Classic Vehicle" designation can now be ordered following the details on the DMV website. These new antique plates can be ordered with up to seven characters in addition to a dot. Vanity plate numbers will be available on a first come first serve basis. The number on your current "Early American" plate (vanity or not) will not be assigned to anyone else but you with the Classic Vehicle designation, but only if you request the new plate design.

Non-vanity Classic Vehicle plates will not be available until from DMV until April 1st. Antique vehicles registered without vanity plates between now and April 1st will continue to be issued the current Early American plate design.

At the request of DMV, I spoke briefly at the press conference today. On behalf of the Connecticut antique auto hobbyist, I thanked DMV Commissioner Currey and members of her staff for their efforts in soliciting input from hobbyists regarding the redesigned antique car plate.

Provided at the end of this Email is a copy of the article I wrote in the February 2014 4C's newsletter regarding the new license plate. This provides additional background information surrounding the redesigned plate.

Redesign and Renaming Early American Plates

From: February 2014 4C's newsletter:

In the last half of 2013, on behalf of the 4C's, Dexter Crowley, John Jarush and I, along with several Connecticut antique auto hobbyists met with the DMV Commissioner and members of her staff to discuss the redesign of the "Early American" license plates being used on antique cars in the state. This article reports on the results of those discussions. I will start with some background information:

BACKGROUND:

Current Early American plates are issued by DMV in accordance with the following State Statute (note the statute does not use the term "Early American"):

Sec. 14-20. Number plates for antique, rare or special interest motor vehicles. Issuance of number plates corresponding to year of manufacture. Registration. Regulations. (a) The Commissioner of Motor Vehicles may issue special number plates for antique, rare or special interest motor vehicles, including antique, rare or special interest motor vehicles that have been modified, such special number plates to be issued on a permanent basis. The commissioner shall charge a fee for such plates which shall cover the entire cost of making the same. An owner of such antique, rare or special interest motor vehicle may use such owner's own porcelain number plate in place of the plates issued by the commissioner provided (1) such plate was originally issued by the department, and (2) such owner files with the commissioner a description and the number of such plate and any additional information the commissioner may require.

(b) Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (a) of this section, section 14-18 and section 14-21b, the owner of such antique, rare or special interest motor vehicle may be authorized by the commissioner to display a number plate originally issued by the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles corresponding to the year of manufacture of such antique, rare or special interest motor vehicle. The commissioner shall issue a certificate of registration, as provided in section 14-12. Such registration shall be valid, subject to renewal, as long as the commissioner permits. Thereafter, the registration number and number plates, if any, which were assigned to such motor vehicle before such registration and number plates were issued under this section, shall be in effect. Each such number plate authorized for use by the commissioner shall be displayed in a conspicuous place at the rear of such motor vehicle at all times while the vehicle is in use or operation upon any public highway. A sticker shall be affixed to each such number plate to denote the expiration date of the registration, unless the commissioner authorizes the sticker, or other evidence of the period of the registration, to be placed elsewhere or carried in such motor vehicle. Such sticker may contain the corresponding letters and numbers of the registration and number plate. The commissioner may adopt regulations, in accordance with chapter 54, to implement the provisions of this section.

The antique, rare or special interest motor vehicle maximum \$500 local property tax assessment statute [Section 12-71 (b)] specifically indicates that this maximum assessment must be applied to any motor vehicle issued a number plate in accordance with Section 14-20 (the above statute) without having to provide any documentation to the local tax assessor. Because of this, it is important that only one variety of number plates be issued for all antique motor vehicles. If more than one variety of an antique motor vehicle plates is created, that would introduce uncertainty as to which plate is the plate issued in accordance with Section 14-20, and to which plate the maximum \$500 assessment limit applies.

RESULTS OF DMV MEETINGS:

The following are the results of the meetings between DMV and Connecticut antique auto hobbyists:

The title on the antique auto plate will be changed from "Early American" to "Classic Vehicle" to be more inclusive of the spectrum of antique vehicles in the state. This change had been requested by Connecticut antique auto hobbyists.

The image of the Hartford Connecticut (Pope Manufacturing) Built 1897 Columbia with Hiram Percy Maxim (the vehicle designer) and Fred Law (the vehicle builder) riding in it is being removed. This will allow up to seven digits license plates in the future.

The new antique auto plate will have a white background with dark blue lettering. An image of the new plate is shown below (without a plate number):

Classic Vehicle

The new antique plate design will be introduced on a "going-forward" basis. Existing Early American plates will not be replaced. Antique vehicle owners who possess the current antique plate ("Early American") design would be able to continue to keep those plates as long as their registrations remain current and do not lapse. However, if a current holder of the current design ("Early American") wants to have a plate replaced because one plate is mutilated, the holder would be required to obtain the new style antique plate since the old style will not be manufactured any longer. The fee would be \$27.

If a current holder of Early American plates wants to get the new style (when it becomes available), they can get the new plates with their existing letters and numbers (as long as the characters remain the same -meaning they are not requesting a new vanity plate). The fee would be \$27. A new vanity plate request in the new style would be required to pay \$96.

Regardless of whether the antique auto has the existing "Early American" or the new "Classic Vehicle" designation on their license plates, the same DMV code would be sent to the municipal property tax assessors identifying that the plates were issued in accordance with Section 14-20 of the State Statutes. With this same code, there should be no ambiguity whether the maximum \$500 property tax assessment applies to vehicles with either the existing "Early American" or the new "Classic Vehicle" license plates.

How to Lock Your Car and Why

I locked my car. As I walked away I heard my car door unlock. I went back and locked my car again three times. Each time, as soon as I started to walk away, I would hear it unlock again!! Naturally alarmed, I looked around and there were two guys sitting in a car in the fire lane next to the store. They were obviously watching me intently, and there was no doubt they were somehow involved in this very weird situation. I quickly chucked the errand I was on, jumped in my car and sped away. I went straight to the police station, told them what had happened, and found out I was part of a new, and very successful, scheme being used to gain entry into cars. Two weeks later, my friend's son had a similar happening....


While traveling, my friend's son stopped at a roadside rest to use the bathroom. When he came out to his car less than 4-5 minutes later, someone had gotten into his car and stolen his cell phone, laptop computer, GPS navigator, briefcase, you name it. He called the police and since there were no signs of his car being broken into, the police told him he had been a victim of the latest robbery tactic -- there is a device that robbers are using now to clone your security code when you lock your doors on your car using your key-chain locking device.

They sit a distance away and watch for their next victim. They know you are going inside of the store, restaurant, or bathroom and that they now have a few minutes to steal and run. The police officer said to manually lock your car door by hitting the lock button inside the car -- that way, if there is someone sitting in a parking lot watching for their next victim, it will not be you.

When you hit the lock button on your car upon exiting, it does not send the security code, but if you walk away and use the door lock on your key chain, it sends the code through the airwaves where it can be instantly stolen.
